

LM 5.8 Create a Torture Museum Poster

In this activity, you are to create a poster for a museum display on torture and execution.

1. Choose Your Topic

- Decide on one method of torture or execution you would like to know more about.
- Decide where you should gather your information. Ask your teacher and/or the teacher-librarian for advice.

2. Record Your Information

As you do your research, record information using **LM 7: T-Chart**. On one side of the chart, write down the things that are important to know about your topic. On the other side, write down the things that are interesting about your topic. Use the criteria below to help you decide in which column to record your information. Attach your completed T-chart to the back of your poster.

IMPORTANT	INTERESTING
• It is the main idea.	• It is surprising or unexpected.
• It is said in different ways.	• It is dramatic or emotional.
• It is part of the title or summary.	• It is larger than life or exaggerated.
• It is an opinion rather than a fact.	• It connects to personal experience or knowledge.

3. Design Your Poster

- Decide on the one or two most important ideas you want your poster to convey to your viewers. Highlight this information on your T-chart.
- Select three visuals that will help viewers understand the importance of this method of torture or execution. Use the information you recorded in the Interesting column of your T-chart to guide you in your choices. Be sure to include visuals that are different from one another while still contributing to your viewers' understanding. You can download your visuals from the Internet, photocopy or scan them from books or magazines, draw them by hand, or re-create them using computer technology.

4. Convey Your Message

- For each of the visuals you have selected, write a descriptive caption. A good caption should:
 - be short
 - add value in the form of additional information
 - be accurately spelled and grammatically correct.
- Have a peer editor check your captions for spelling and grammar.

- Create an appropriate title, and identify the civilization and the period in which this method of torture or execution was used.
- Use the computer lab to choose fonts and font sizes that will give your poster a professional look. Arrange your visuals and captions in a visually appealing way on your poster.
- Add your poster to the classroom display in chronological order according to the period.
